India Heritage Museum

India Heritage Museum (IHM) was formed in 2019 as a DBA of the Hindu Heritage Summer Camp, Inc. The primary objective of the IHM is educational, to create awareness in the Rochester community of the culture, art, tradition, diversity, and technological advances of India and to highlight the accomplishments of Indo-American community of Rochester.

This is IHM's nineth exhibit. Past exhibits by IHM included the recently concluded series of 6 sessions on Flavors of India, a virtual exhibit delivered direct to home. The IHM also took its Punjab exhibit to the Rochester Central Library where the artefacts were on display from December 2021 to March 2022. Prior events at the Luthra Heritage center included Indo-American Artists of Rochester, States of India—through the lens of youth, Religions of India, Punjab: Land of Five Rivers, Indian Cinema: A Rochester Connection, Inspirational Americans of Indian Origins – by youth, and Ayurveda – Holistic Medicine from India. The IHM also organized an outdoor Mela in the summer of 2021."

Weaves and Fabrics of India

About the Exhibit......

The story of textiles in India is one of the oldest in the world, with Indian cotton threads dating to 4000 BC and dyed fabrics documented as far back as 2500 BC. India's textiles were so central to its identity that in ancient Greece and Babylon the very name 'India' was shorthand for 'cotton'. Blue dye was so associated with India, the Greeks took its western name – indikos (indigo) – from the country itself. (1)

This exhibit covers the story of Indian Textiles – the diversity and beauty of Weaves and Fabrics of India, by focusing on the *Indian Saree*. Saree is a unifying feature of Indian women's dress.

Saree is conceived on the loom as a three-dimensional garment with variables in pattern, weave, and structure between its inner and outer end pieces and its two borders. The borders provide the strength and weight while the body enhances its drape. All these elements help maintain the form of the saree when it is worn.

Our exhibit will have displays featuring sarees from various parts of India, will discuss the techniques of textile decorations, introduce you to the craftsmen, their capabilities and the dire circumstances in which the handloom tradition survives today to ensure that 'design' emerges.
